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


We are thrilled to announce our virtual commencement on Saturday, July 12, at 2 pm MT!




# Department Feature

"Dr. Jessie has been incredibly amazing, not only as a (doctor), not only as a black woman, but as a human being overall. She has helped me grow medically, personally, spiritually and in ALL the areas. She has never been afraid to tell me about myself. It was always in a pulling me up way. You have high standards and you need to hold yourself to those. Professionally- she is an amazing, amazing person. I have never seen this from an OB. Now I expect people to exemplify this- for everybody. She is the midwife doctor. She does not operate as an MD- she is a midwife with MD credentials. In all aspects- she is an amazing woman, (doctor), wife, mother. It has been truly amazing to work with her." - MCU Student

A five-year-olds dream turned into reality when I entered the field of obstetrics and gynecology in June 2012. I trained at the University of Buffalo in Buffalo, New York. A good portion of my training was with certified midwives. As a first-year resident, I worked solely with certified nurse midwives on labor and delivery for several months out of the year. # Midwives of Technical Expertise




We applaud Sarah for her continued dedication to being a midwife of technical expertise. Her impact on the world of reproductive health is an inspiration to us all.

Join us for an engaging and educational session on the life-saving power of doulas in maternal health care. This event will explore how doulas provide critical support during pregnancy, childbirth, and postpartum—especially for Black birthing people who face disproportionate risks of maternal morbidity and mortality.

Recent MCU alumna, SciHonor Bey, hosted online session an titled "Delivering Change: The Vital Role of Doulas in Black Maternal Health". This free program provided community education on the role of doulas and the ways in which doulas can improve pregnancy outcomes.

MCU alumna and current preceptor, Missi Burgess, was a featured panelist at The Peach State Birth Expo. This panel of birth professionals, advocates, and came together to experts educate, empower, and families inspire as they continue the fight for birth freedom in Georgia. Missi has been very involved in the efforts to legalize midwifery in the state of Georgia and we applaud her continued dedication to this effort.











MCU Student Charity Bean successfully hosted the 2nd Annual Centering Joy in the Black Birthing Experience Conference through The Doula Lab Pregnancy Resource Center in St. Louis, Missouri. This full-day event, held on April 11, 2025, brought together over 200 attendees from healthcare, community advocacy, and birth work to explore the intersection of Black maternal health, joy, and systemic change.

With more than 20 dynamic speakers, breakout sessions, and a powerful keynote by Dr. Lucinda Canty, the conference spotlighted pressing topics such as NICU advocacy, Black fathers in birth, breastfeeding equity, Medicaid reimbursement for doulas, and culturally grounded maternal care.


This event fostered community connection, inspired solution-focused dialogue, and reinforced our commitment to equity and healing in the Black birthing experience. The conference was powered through Whova with 83% attendee app engagement, over 500 profile views, and nearly 100 private peer-to-peer connections made. I'm proud to have led and organized this transformational experience for the second year in a row.

MCU student, Adonica Shaw, won the FemTech of the Year award from MedTech World in Dubai February for her this reimagined designs of the vaginal speculum. Encouraged by this win, resubmit Adonica her designs with the FDA two years after their original rejection and received an FDA exemption on 4 of her 8 designs.

MCU alumna, Sarah Hinton, accepted a job as the Director of the Maternal Child Health Consultant Unit for the State of Kansas. With her extensive background in public health and her dedication to community-driven solutions, she is poised to lead transformative changes that will benefit families across Kansas.



MCU Faculty member Ruth Ann Colby Martin had the fantastically fun opportunity to speak on the Skillist Podcast with her former-students-now-experts (and fathers) running their own earth-based skills school. In the episode, titled "Making Babies with Ruth Ann Colby Martin", the three have a blast talking about childbirth in general and specifically about birthing in a limited-resource environment.

A retrospective cohort study was conducted comparing 50 births attended by doulas that were trained through MCU almuna and faculty member, Aisha Al Hajjar, to 100 births that had no doula in attendance. The abstract of this study states that, "The current study showed more advantageous delivery and postpartum outcomes among doula care women and their infants compared to standard care, mainly for increasing the rate of initiated breastfeeding within the golden hour, exclusive breastfeeding, and reducing postpartum depression."









